
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

Reflection on the Meaning of the Marian Grotto at St. Andrew Abbey

This year we commemorate the 70th anniversary of the Grotto at St. Andrew Abbey. In honor of this anniversary, we have been revitalizing and refurbishing the space with the generous support of alumni and friends.

The history of the abbey dates back to its founding by the Slovak monks in 1922. The grotto itself, was inspired by coach Augie Bossu and constructed in 1954 to serve as a space for prayer and reflection for the football team. See full story on page 6.

Historically, grottos hold a special place in Catholic tradition. The presence of the Virgin Mary in the grotto underscores themes of maternal care, intercession, and the nurturing aspect of Mary's presence in our lives. MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Benedictine Family and Friends,

I am writing this edition of the Ora et Labora President update with a heavy heart. As I am sure many of you have heard by now, the Benedictine community lost one of the "rocks" of our foundation on June 30th. Mr. Anthony Russ '66, or as many of us called him Coach Russ or simply T.R. was welcomed into heaven. His life and Benedictine legacy will be written about and remembered for many years to come as thousands of Men of Benedictine, their families and friends reflect on a truly amazing life of dedication and service to Benedictine High School. I cannot do justice to what certainly deserves ample thought and reflection to honor a man that was one of those people who without question changed lives of those he came into contact with. I thought I would share my personal reflection as one of my fondest memories of Benedictine involves an interaction with Coach Russ. Unknown to me at the time, that life lesson he provided me is one that I continue to lean on throughout my adult life.

I don't think it is coincidental that my memory coincides with the fall start of school, but as we prepare to welcome another strong freshman class of 90+ to start their journey as Men of Benedictine, I only hope that those of us in the building as teachers, administrators and supporting staff might impact them just as Coach Russ did for me in the fall of 1988. You see, for many who call Benedictine home, there is a right of passage, so to speak, in August reporting to two-a-day football practice. I recall going into my junior year, so hopeful to earn my place on the varsity squad in a role more than just a third team practice squad quarterback. All I could think about that summer was competing for the starting QB position and earning my varsity letter. To do that, however, was not going to be easy. I was undersized with a decent but not overly strong arm, so when two-a-days started, I was crushed to learn that Coach Bossu had already decided that I was not his guy to lead the Bengals offense. I was not only devastated, but motivated even more to play and become a starter.

Enter Coach Russ. My relationship with Coach Russ did not really develop until the second week of that junior season. Certainly I witnessed his intensity, the famous scowl when the defense missed an assignment, and, of course, his temper. I will never forget the time when I was a sophomore QB on the practice squad and I managed to get past his number one defense on an option play. He called out to Coach Bortnick, "Run that play again, Art!" and then added, "And Schroeder, keep the ball." Talk about scared, wow! Anyway, back to the story. After that first game, I walked into the coaches office and said I wanted to play and that I wanted to be a defensive starter. Coach Nolan looked at me and said, "Go talk to TR."

This is where a life lesson that I still recall clearly to this day happened. I timidly walked into his office, suggested he take a serious look at me for his defense, and then waited. He dropped his pencil, looked up at me and said, "You're a quarterback; you really want to play on my defense?" I swallowed and said, "I am a football player and I want to play!" He smiled and said, "Okay, I will give you a shot." From that moment, something changed in me. The vote of confidence from a man who, to this day, I still fear out of respect was like a lightning bolt going off in me. I went on to start the rest of my junior year and was named captain of Coach Russ's defense my senior year. Years later, I look back on that moment, that interaction, and that simple gesture and I lean on it whenever adversity presents itself.

Coach, I still fear you in the most respectful way, but your kindness, your big heart, and the way you influenced me will never be forgotten. Thank You!

ABBEY RETREAT and MONKS' ANNIVERSARIES

As is customary for members of religious orders and priests in the Catholic Church, the monks of Saint Andrew Abbey pause for four days each year and make a retreat. In recent years this has taken place at Loyola Retreat House in Clinton, Ohio (near Akron) which has been sponsored by Saint Andrew Abbey since 2010. This year's retreat took place there from June 4–7.

This year's retreat master was something of a surprise to the monks. Fr. Vincent (Paul) Velas graduated from BHS in 1955 and entered the abbey as a monk two years later. He was ordained in 1964 and taught German in the high school until 1974 when he received permission to become a priest of the Diocese of Pittsburgh where he has served in a number of parishes until retiring a few years ago.

When he was a member of the Benedictine faculty, Fr. Vincent was well-liked by the students in his German classes. **Dennis DiGeronimo '71** would bring in his accordion and Fr. Vincent would lead the students in singing traditional German songs (see photo). Fr. Vincent's retreat conferences were reflections on humanity as created by God, trapped by Satan, and ransomed by Christ and the Holy Spirit.

During the final Mass of the retreat, the monks publicly renew their monastic vows. It is also the time to give special recognition to those monks marking their 25th or 50th jubilee of profession. This summer Fr. Gerard Gonda, OSB '71 and Brother Philip Petrow, OSB marked the 50th year of their monastic lives. After they renewed their vows, Abbot

Two Monks Reach Monastic Milestone Written by FATHER MICHAEL

June 7 was the final day of the monastic retreat this year. It was particularly festive for, during the mass at which the monks renew their vows, the community celebrated the golden jubilees of two of its members. **Brother Philip Petrow, OSB** and **Father Gerard Gonda, OSB** marked this monastic milestone by being presented with a jubilee candle and staff that have traditionally marked this occasion in Benedictine monasteries. Both professed monastic vows on August 18, 1974.

Raised in Brooklyn, Ohio and a member of Corpus Christi Parish, Brother Philip graduated from Brooklyn High School and became a Registered Nurse through the Marymount School of Nursing. After profession, he led the Transportation Department of Benedictine High School with certification from the New York Technical Institute for Auto Mechanics. He was also trained at Max Hayes Industrial campus for a license in boiler maintenance. For 30 years, Brother Philip worked for Red Cross Disaster Relief as an on-site coordinator for which he prepared through the Cleveland Clinic EMT Paramedic Training Program. This work took him all over the US in some of the most problematic situations imaginable. Upon his return to the monastery, he has served as IT Coordinator for the abbey computer needs which also involves the Heating and Air-Conditioning Systems for which

he trained at the West-Side Technological Institute for Computer Management and Pneumatic Controls. Studying Evangelization at the University of Steubenville, he also evinced an interest in social justice through work at the local St. Benedict Parish where he helped to meet the food and clothing needs of the local poor.

A leader in Catholic Education for many years, Fr. Gerard taught English at Benedictine High School for over 40 years. A 1971 graduate of the Home of Champions, he distinguished himself as teacher, alumni director, admissions director and many other tasks before joining the administration. His educational studies from John Carroll University and the success of these endeavors in the administration of Benedictine earned him the Distinguished Alumni Service Award

NEW SUPERIORS NAMED FOR St. Andrew Abbey Written by Father Gerard, OSB '71

During the monastic community retreat in early June, Abbot Gary Hoover, OSB announced the appointments of a new prior and subprior for three year terms. The prior is the abbot's primary assistant and leads the community in the abbot's absence. The prior is responsible for the internal operation of the abbey and for responding to outside requests for monks' ministerial assistance. The subprior is the third superior and stands in for the abbot and prior when needed.

Fr. Michael Brunovsky, OSB, 60, is the new prior. Fr. Michael grew up in St. Columbkille Parish in Seven Hills and is a graduate of Padua High School. In the abbey he has served for many years as the director of new monks in formation and as the Music Director and organist. He professed his first vows in 1985 and was ordained in 1993. His most recent assignment was subprior. He continues in his role as secretary to the abbot. In the high school, Fr. Michael has primarily taught social studies and served as assistant principal and principal. He represents the abbey as a member of national and local Slovak organizations.

Fr. Conrad Wald, OSB, 60, was named subprior. Born in Germany, he came to the United States as a child and grew up in Atlanta, Georgia. Raised in the Episcopal Church, he converted to Catholicism in 2003. He earned a master's degree in Political Science from The Ohio State University and worked for a number of years in pension plan administration with various companies in Ohio and New York. He entered the abbey and professed his first vows as a monk in 2013. He continued with studies for the priesthood and was ordained in 2019. He will continue in his position as business manager of the abbey.





in 2001. Fr. Gerard has served as Academic Dean, Principal and President of Benedictine High School, leading capital initiatives and improvements over the years. Since retiring from the classroom, he has used his extensive relationships with alumni and benefactors through working tirelessly in Advancement. For the Centennial of the Abbey in 2022, he spearheaded a committee that planned jubilee events and put his noted writing skills into the compilation of a Centennial Commemorative Book highlighting the history of the Benedictines in Cleveland. A noted speaker and presenter on contemporary religious topics, Fr. Gerard has given retreats and presentations throughout the Cleveland Diocese and the United States. Willing to try new opportunities in serving the Church, Fr. Gerard now serves as a military chaplain to the Kings Bay Submarine Base in Georgia at the request of Archbishop Timothy Broglio, a Cleveland

native and personal friend.

Bro. Philip and Fr. Gerard received their 50th jubilee year ceremonial staff from Abbot Gary. May the Lord God grant both Br. Philip and Fr. Gerard continued good health and the consolation of the Holy Spirit as they continue their monastic commitment. *Ad Multos Annos!*



Grotto History

In November of 1953, a lead story in The Bennet announced plans to move forward with the construction of a shrine to the Blessed Mother to be built on campus. That was the moment that a vision inspired by Coach Augie Bossu began to take form.

As Benedictine's legendary football and baseball coach for five decades, Augie Bossu is not often associated with the University of Notre Dame, but that is where he graduated from in 1939 and helped the Fighting Irish to an 8-1 record. Apart from academics and football, Augie's Catholic faith was strongly impacted by his four years at the South Bend campus, especially by the famous replica of the stone grotto in Lourdes, France where the Blessed Virgin appeared to St. Bernadette seventeen times in 1858.

The current Grotto at NDU was built in 1896, replacing a wooden grotto built on August 22, 1878. An artificial rock cave, the Grotto is used by students and visitors as a sacred space for prayer, meditation, and outdoor Masses. Groups like to gather there before and after football games and final exams.

As he began his coaching career at Benedictine in 1953, Augie felt his football teams needed a meaningful space on campus for prayer and reflection. He recommended the construction of the grotto as such a place and further suggested that it be similar to the Lourdes Grotto at Notre Dame.

The project was taken up by the senior Class of 1954 under the direction of class president Chuck St. John. The significant sum of \$3,000 had to be raised. The class officers came up with a


plan that required each senior to donate \$2 while juniors, sophomores, and freshmen each donated \$1. Remember the value of money at the time and also that the BHS enrollment had reached 1,000 students.

The drive was launched before Christmas and groundbreaking took place early in the second semester. Class president Chuck St. John '54 remembers that the senior class sponsored a musical show at St. Benedict's parish hall at which the hat was passed for donations for the new grotto from the large crowd. The original dedication of the grotto took place on May 30, 1954 as a May crowning with Chuck St. John having the honor of crowning the statue. The student body processed down East Boulevard around St. Benedict's Church and then back to the grotto. While in procession, they prayed the rosary led over a public address system by seniors William Gries, Lawrence Louis, Robert Pimpo, and Robert Rezac. Mary's statue was carried by Bengal gridders Paul Djubasak, Robert Hallahan, Frank Kuchta, and Theodore Rossy. A flowery wreath was placed on Mary's head by Charles St. John.


For 70 years, the grotto has stood as a site of spiritual reflection, silence, and beauty. Early in its history, Benedictine High School was placed under the protection of the Blessed Mother and her colors of blue and white were adopted as the school's colors. Coach Bossu began the tradition of having his football players stop at the grotto on the way to practice and then gather as a team after each game to give thanks – regardless of the

outcome of the game.

Over this past summer, the grotto underwent a complete refurbishment to help restore it closely to its original glory ensuring that the space will continue to be a vital reflection point for students, families, and friends of Benedictine for decades to come.



In honor of the 70th anniversary of the Grotto's construction in 1954, we look forward to celebrating this important milestone, as well as showcasing the beautified transformation at this year's annual Abbey Benefit which will be held on Sunday, September 29th here on the campus. Fr. Dismas Speaks at Abbots' Workshop

Fr. Dismas Boeff, OSB '66 was one of the featured speakers at the annual meeting of the North American Benedictine Abbots held at Prince of Peace Abbey in Oceanside, California from February 2–6, 2024. Fr. Dismas accompanied Abbot Gary Hoover, OSB and spoke on "Understanding and Confronting Addictions." He shared personal experiences and the work he has done for many years counseling individuals with various addictions. Since his ordination in 1976, Fr. Dismas has worked at BHS, served as a prison chaplain both locally and at the federal level, and provided health care ministry at Southwest General Health Center in Middleburg Heights. Also attending the February meeting was Abbot Primate Gregory Polan, OSB from Rome, head of the worldwide Benedictine Order.

Beloved Legendary Teacher, Coach, Administrator Passes Away

Tony Russ '66, a long-time teacher, coach, administrator, and a legendary figure to thousands of Benedictine students, died on June 30, 2024 at age 75.

Russ served in many roles while at Benedictine including wrestling coach, Dean of Men, and most recently Athletic Director before retiring in 2013 after 44 years at the school.


He was a member of the second Benedictine Athletic Hall of Fame class in 1993.

For decades, Russ was a long-time assistant under head football coach Augie Bossu and succeeding coaches.

Russ was a coach on six Benedictine state championship football teams, 1973, 1980, 1981, 1996, 2003 and 2004.

Benedictine head football coach Joe Prevesk '94 said that the Bengals will dedicate their 2024 season to Coach Tony Russ.







CARING TASKMASTER

While Russ did not achieve much public recognition in the media, the influence on his students and teams was inestimable.

"As Dean of Men and disciplinarian, Tony's image as a tough coach was his most valuable asset. He never smiled during school hours. He could walk into an unruly dining hall or study hall and suddenly there was complete silence," said Fr. Gerard Gonda, O.S.B. '71, former president, and principal.

Beneath his gruff demeanor and tough-love discipline, Russ could be a most humble man.

Benedictine Chief Operating Officer Chris Lorber '04 said, "After he announced his retirement, Tony kindly served an additional eight months in the Athletic Director's office to help me as a young professional. He handled the odd responsibilities of the job which allowed me to coach. He was always available to answer questions and provide insight," added Lorber.

"It was during this time that I finally saw him, not as an intimidating disciplinarian, but instead as a friend, mentor and inspiration," he added.

Dave Schroeder '90, current Benedictine President, and former captain of the 1989 Bengals defense, is thankful today for the difficulties of practice days and game nights under the guidance of Tony Russ.

Said Schroeder, "Coach Russ continually challenged me on the football field to overcome adversity to become a better player. I will never forget the chance he gave me to prove myself. That confidence he instilled helped me realize that adversity often brings opportunity. And that realization has been a significant tool in my business career."

"We will continue to uphold his legacy at the Home of Champions with current and future Bengals as he had represented Benedictine High School," Schroeder added.

Former school president Ryan Ryzner '95 said, "Tony Russ said do your job and understand how it relates to the job of others around you. Be gracious. Be accountable and hold those around you to that same high standard."

Continued Ryzner, "We thought he was giving us the game plan for Friday night's game. He was giving us the playbook for servant leadership in life. For those who knew him, you know you were blessed. For those who didn't, ask someone who did and pull up a chair..."

DEFENSIVE GENIUS

As defensive coordinator and architect of the historically-tough Bengals defenses, Russ was renowned for his ability to shut down opposing team's high-powered offenses.

In the 1980 and the 1996 state title game wins, the Bengals did not allow their opponents to complete a pass.

From 1961 to 1997, Benedictine compiled a streak of holding at least one team to a shutout in each of those years. Russ played major roles for much of this streak both as a player and a coach.

In 1996, the Bengals defensive unit honored Russ by giving him a game ball after the team held its fourth straight opponent to a shutout, a school record.

He joined the Benedictine faculty in the fall of 1970 as an English teacher and football coach and moved up to the varsity staff in 1971. He was the head coach of the 1970 freshman football team, and his impact was immediate. That team went 7-0 and outscored opponents 200-6. Later, with Russ in charge of the defense, those players as seniors won the school's (and Cleveland's) first state playoff title with a 38-13 win over Ironton in 1973.

PLAYING DAYS

A three-year letterman at Benedictine, Russ played on the offensive and defensive lines. As a senior, he gained local accolades as an All-East Senate choice and All-Scholastic selection by the Plain Dealer, Cleveland Press and the Call and Post newspapers. He also won All-Ohio honors and played in the annual North-South All-Star game.

Russ was a captain on the 1965 Bengals team that finished as the area's No. 1 team and was the highest-scoring team to that date in school history.

He played in three consecutive City Championship Games at the old Cleveland Stadium winning titles in 1963 and 1965.

In that 1965 title game, Russ blocked a South High punt to put the Bengals in scoring position. Later at a crucial point in the game, with the Bengals leading 14-0, South had driven to the Bengals five-yard line. On fourth down, the Flyers star running back tried to sweep right end but was thrown for a four-yard loss. It was Tony Russ who led the barrage of Bengals defenders to make the stop.

From there, the Bengals drove 91 yards for the score to increase their margin to 21-0. "That was the turning point," said Coach Bossu after the game.

It helped Benedictine to win another Charity Game title 29–8 over South in front of a crowd of 36,202.

He earned a scholarship to the University of Cincinnati but knee injuries requiring several surgeries ended his playing career.

Russ lived in North Royalton with his wife of nearly 50 years, Ginny. He is also survived by his brothers Tim '68 and Bob '72 and their spouses, in-laws and many nieces and nephews.

A funeral Mass was held for Tony Russ on Wednesday, July 10 at St. Andrew Abbey on the Benedictine campus followed by a reception in the school dining hall. In lieu of flowers, the family suggests contributions to Benedictine High School, Advancement Office, 2900 Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, Cleveland, OH 44104.









This past June marked the 80th anniversary of D-Day in France, and Maj. Jack Gibson '06 joined the commemoration in honor of his grandfather, whom he affectionately called "Papa."

Jim Shalala was a World War II veteran who served with the 2nd Ranger Battalion during the invasion of Europe. Although he rarely talked about the war, Gibson remembers him tearing up when he did speak of combat. Papa was simply Gibson's hero. Sadly, he was killed in a car crash at the age of 84, and his stories stopped, but his legacy lives on in Jack.

After graduating from Benedictine, Gibson followed in his grandfather's footsteps to join the army by graduating from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point before beginning active duty service. During his military career, he had two deployments to Afghanistan, and in 2022, he deployed as a member of the 75th Ranger Regiment. He is also a University of Georgia Law School graduate and, for many years, was stationed at Fort Moore, serving as the unit's regimental judge advocate. Recently, he relocated to Austin, TX, to be stationed at Fort Cavazos assigned to the 1st Cavalry Division as the Chief of Administrative Law.

Aside from becoming a Ranger himself, one of the greatest ways he could honor his grandfather's memory was to make the trip to France and visit the country that his grandfather helped to liberate. He made the emotional trip with 120 fellow Rangers and 21 family members connected to his grandfather, including his wife Meredith, infant daughter Davis, his mother, and brothers Mike '04 and Pat '02.

The 10-day trip served as an official duty trip for the members of his unit, and they proudly represented the United States and the Department of Defense at a variety of commemorative events. Their itinerary took them on tours of battlefields and key D-Day sites where allied forces landed. From the beaches of Omaha, Utah, and Juno to sites where paratroopers landed to the initial battlegrounds, they got a real sense of what the events of June 6, 1944, must have been like for his grandfather and all US forces.

Omaha Beach was particularly poignant since it saw the highest number of US casualties during the invasion. Jack shared that being there and seeing the gradual slope of the hill, coupled with the 5-6 mile visibility the Germans would have had, led him to understand that the soldiers were "sitting ducks." One activity they took part in was a fitness exercise where they ran down the beach, into the water, and did buddy carries, which are over-the-shoulder carries of a fellow soldier. This exercise gave them a sense of what the soldiers would have felt without simulating warfare.

There were close to 120 commemorative events throughout the course of their trip. Some larger ones were hosted by the national French government, but many events were organized by the small towns and villages to celebrate their liberation. Jack described June 6th in Normandy as having a similar feel to July 4th celebrations in the US.

One thing that stood out for Jack was the intense patriotism and pride he felt from the Norman people. He said, "I compare the trip to other patriotic sites I have visited in the US and feel they can't compare. I was especially touched by how grateful Normans remain today. They show a lot of gratitude for the US and allied forces that liberated them from Nazi rule that had gripped them for 4-5 years before D-Day."

Roughly 600 people also attended a large ceremony for a battalion change of command at Pointe du Hoc that Jack describes as breathtaking. This site is run by the American Battle Monument Commission and is kept as close to June 6th, 1944, as possible, with bunkers, craters, and artillery. Jack's grandfather was part of one of the most daring missions of all when they scaled this cliff and seized the German artillery pieces that could have fired upon troops landing at Omaha and Utah beaches. He also noted that the last surviving member of the troop, John Wardell, was present at the Change of Command Ceremony.

Another highlight of the trip was a parachuting operation, where they had the opportunity to jump from a C47 airplane used in WWII that has been meticulously maintained. With 20 planes and 700-800 US and Allied soldiers participating, it was a spectacular sight.

This trip was a momentous time for Jack and offered great opportunities for reflection. He shares that Benedictine does a great job preparing students for life. Three core values from Benedictine paved the way for him to have a successful military career: high standards, hard work, and discipline. He went on to share that Mr. Francioli always had unwavering academic standards. Coach Bortnick demonstrated the importance of work ethic. He also shared that in all his years in the military, he has never met someone who displays and demands more discipline than the late Coach Russ. He is grateful for the foundation laid by his four years at Benedictine and encourages future Men of Benedictine to embrace the opportunities ahead.


SPRING SPORTS WRAP-UP






MESSAGE FROM THE COO

Turning Tax Dollars into Tuition Dollars

Dear Alumni and Friends,

The sight of athletic teams practicing, the band rehearsing, faculty prepping their classrooms, and our dedicated maintenance team tidying up final building improvements in early August means one thing... The start of the 98th academic year at Benedictine High School is just a few weeks away!



As you have read throughout our communications last year, Benedictine High School proudly launched our own Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) called *BengalSGO*. As a reminder, *BengalSGO* is an accredited initiative that allows those living in the State of Ohio, who have an Ohio tax liability, to make a contribution up to \$750 or \$1,500 for married couples to receive a dollar for dollar tax credit. We communicate the opportunity by stating it is "Turning Tax Dollars into Tuition Dollars!"

To assist with some additional frequently asked questions, here are a few of the most common inquiries:

How do I receive the BengalSGO tax credit with the State of Ohio?

Taxpayers claim the credit when they complete their tax return by writing in their contribution amount on the designated lines of the Ohio individual income tax return and attaching their tax receipt from the **BengalSGO**. You will not receive the benefit of the **BengalSGO** if you do not have a tax liability to the State of Ohio or have other Ohio tax credits that reduce your Ohio tax liability to zero.

How does the new tax credit allow me a dollar for dollar credit?

• If you owe money for the current tax year, you deduct the amount you contribute to the **BengalSGO** from what you owe. Example: You owe \$1,000 to the state, and you make a tax credit contribution of \$750. You now only owe the state \$250.

• If the state owes you a refund for the current tax year, your refund will increase by the amount you contribute to the **BengalSGO**. Example: You are due a refund from the state of \$500. You make a tax credit contribution of \$750, and you've increased your refund to \$1,250.
